

# Mary Tavy Parish Council

We are pleased to be able to report that a meeting has been held with an officer of WDBC regarding the condition of pathways and the need for boundary management and tree work in the parish churchyard. The outcome was very positive and we are certain that better physical management of our churchyard will occur as a result. This in turn will allow us to improve the appearance and functionality of the adjoining parish cemetery. However, we are saddened to note that problems still appear to exist with regard to headstones and floral tributes in our parish cemetery. We have reviewed the matter in depth and have given very specific instructions to our contractor concerning the removal of dead flowers and the need to replace flower vases after grass cutting has been completed. Floral tributes are of course easily damaged and displaced by the elements and are often the target of small animals such as rabbits. It is unreasonable to expect our contractor to have the time or the knowledge to replace them on the correct grave. However, we must stress that we depend on those parishioners visiting graves to be understanding and to use common sense when placing floral tributes to allow for the easy cutting of grass by either mower or strimmer. We regret that our cemetery noticeboard has had to be removed for some very necessary repairs to be carried out. Therefore any parishioner who is unsure of the regulations governing our parish cemetery should, in the short term, seek advice from our Parish Clerk.

I have been asked to point out that, following this Council's decision to cancel plans to extend the parish cemetery, we are always looking for an alternative site. This decision to cancel was, of course, taken on the grounds of the unsuitability of the proposed site and the high costs involved. Unfortunately land in the parish is highly sought after and commands high prices. Therefore if any parishioner can assist us in this search please contact us as soon as possible.

Recently MTPC received a complaint from a parishioner concerning the felling of mature trees within the Parish and the apparent failure of the Council to stop such work taking place. Needless to say it is a complete misconception

to believe that a Parish Council has statutory powers in such matters. Many parishioners rightly take the view that, as the tree work they wish to undertake is on private property without the hindrance of Tree Protection Orders and Conservation Area restrictions, they are not obliged to inform us of their plans. If we believe such work to be ill-advised or extreme the only course of action open to us is to bring the problem to the attention of the Trees & Landscape Officer of the DNPA. We also examine closely all planning applications involving trees but as none of us holds professional qualifications on arboreal matters we rely on common sense and the professional advice of others. We always recommend to parishioners who approach us for guidance that they should seek the advice of a properly qualified Tree Surgeon and if necessary the consent of the relevant authorities before commencing work. In the last 2 cases reviewed by MTPC this is exactly the procedure that was followed to the satisfaction of all concerned.

MTPC will undertake the Beating of the Bounds on the 12th August. This ancient ceremony, which dates back to at least Anglo-Saxon times, is of course a reflection of an age when maps were a rarity and literacy the privilege of the very few. Parishioners walked the parish boundary to establish in everyone's memory the exact limits of their own parish with its necessary rights and privileges. All arrangements are in place for our modern version with the 27km distance being split into 3 sections. Please note that if you wish to take part prior registration is mandatory as we have to satisfy Health & Safety regulations. Entry forms are available in this Newsletter, from our website and from Mary Tavy Post Office and Stores.

Finally, I have been asked to remind all parishioners who use local moorland and public footpaths to exercise their dogs to keep their animals on a lead. We have already received complaints of sheep worrying by dogs not properly controlled. Frankly it is little wonder that when this happens the farming members of our community begin to consider the need for drastic action against both uncontrolled dogs and their irresponsible owners.

# **Beating the Bounds**

On Sunday 12 August we'll be beating the bounds. All parishioners are invited to take part in this traditional walk around the parish boundary. Hopefully some hardy trekkers will walk the whole distance, however in the interests of allowing as many people of all ages and abilities as possible to join the event the course has been divided into three sections.

Those wishing to attempt the entire distance of around 27km will start from Tavy St Mary Church at 9am.

A second group wishing to attempt our medium distance course will be transported by coach - for which we are grateful to CJ Down - from the Coronation Hall to Brinsabach (beyond the Gliding Club) where they will join the first group to continue the walk. The distance this second group will cover is in the region of 16km.

A stop for lunch at Lydford Station will also see a third group of walkers join in. Again transport will be provided for those wishing to join in for the short course which will cover the last 9.5km and bring everybody back to the Church.

Allowing the two additional starts also means we have two points from which walkers can 'bail out' should they feel that cannot make it any further. It should also allow families with younger children to take part. We would advise that children under the age of 9 should not attempt the entire course.

Lunch will be provided for those doing the complete boundary and a barbeque at the Coronation Hall from 5pm onwards will await everybody who has completed any distance. A complimentary burger and drink will be provided for all those you registered to take part but we encourage all of you to bring family and friends to celebrate your achievement.

During the day we would ask that walkers stay together as a group as much as possible. Group and section leaders made up from volunteers within our community will assist and ensure everybody keeps on track. These leaders have already walked their sections to ensure the route is safe and passable. We owe great thanks to Cllr Graham Ross, Beverly Ross, John and Wendy Bagnall and Nick Butland for all their help and support organising the event. Thanks go to Cheryl Downham for kindly agreeing to man the barbeque.

# "Upset by trifles"

# As you walk the parish bounds this August spare a thought for William Ball

William was a farm labourer at Holditch Farm in the early 1900s. Before he came to Mary Tavy he had a riding accident which resulted in him suffering severe headaches as well as memory loss, which a doctor had put down to "the shock of the accident." In the doctor's words it caused Ball to be "upset by trifles."

On 7th August 1905, a Bank Holiday Monday, William Ball went missing. He'd been seen earlier that day at Blackdown and it was believed he had been on his way to Willsworthy. When he had not returned that night it was assumed he had gone to visit friends; however as the day went on his family became concerned and sent telegrams to Tavistock and Princetown enquiring if he had been seen; the response came that there had been no sightings of him.

What caused great concern was that the whole area was pitted with open mine shafts belonging to Devon Friendship Mine and it was feared he may have fallen into one. Search parties were organised and over the next few days the police and the villagers accompanied by their dogs spread out all over the area in the hope of finding him. The rector of Mary Tavy, Mr. I K. Anderson, not only joined in the search but even removed the bell ropes from St. Mary's Tower so that they could be used for men to descend the mine shafts to ensure that Ball was not at the bottom of one. Despite an exhaustive search, there was no sign of William Ball and hopes of him being found alive were fading.

Some days later a family from London who were on holiday at the Manor Hotel in Lydford took a horse ride across the moor. When they came to the boundary stones on the Mary Tavy and Willsworthy Manor bounds, Mr. Boulton noticed a man lying on the ground; at first he thought he was taking a snooze but soon discovered that the man was dead.

Under the direction of the police the body was laid on a gate which was fastened to a cart, and they went down to the schoolroom at Mary Tavy. When they couldn't get the gate through the door it was taken instead to one of the buildings at Wheal Friendship.

William Ball's inquest was held on 16th August in the Counting House at Wheal Friendship [now Glebe Cottage]. Police Constable Berry from Lydford testified that he found the deceased lying face down and that nearby was a rusty razor. There were no signs of a struggle or of a second party being involved. On the arrival of PC Heale from Mary Tavy the body was searched and they found a note which read "I know this will be a great trouble to you all, and to all the family, but I cannot help it. I am just mad. Oh my poor head."

PC Heale added that he had always regarded Ball as being "very reserved and peculiar". The coroner summed up by saying the deceased had "allowed trifles to worry him which had led to the loss of his mental balance." The Jury returned a verdict of "suicide whilst temporarily insane."

Shortly after the inquest the coffin was carried to the Parish Churchyard for the funeral. It was reported that many villagers stood along the route to pay their final respects. Rev. Anderson refused to perform a service because the order of service for funerals stated it was not to be used for any that have "laid violent hands upon themselves."



# Update on the proposal for Allotments

I was very pleased with the level of response to my article in newsletter 20. As a consequence of the large number of enquiries, I was able to demonstrate the high level of demand for allotments within the village by presenting to the Parish Council 13 letters requesting plots. This is more than twice the number needed under legislation which requires a response from the Council.

Although the first location proposed proved to be unsuitable, a much more appropriate site was suggested by the Council and my formal proposition will be submitted to the appropriate committee this week.

In the meantime all of us who have submitted requests for plots will be meeting at the start of August to begin organising ourselves into an association, adopting a constitution and agreeing a set of rules by which the site will be run.

I am so very grateful to those who have supported me with this initiative.

From the Jubilee Group who have published articles and offered advice, the Coronation Hall for allowing us to meet, to the Duchy of Cornwall and the very large number of people from the village who have approached me to wish the project well or offer advice and information. With this continued level of support I am very optimisticthat we will see allotments within the village in the very near future.
